

REMEMBER THE MANCHESTER FREE PRESS?



If you lived in Manchester during the early 1960s, you probably remember the free newspaper called the Manchester Free Press. Then came Wednesday, The Wednesday Journal, The Journal, Manchester Journal, and Southern New Hampshire Journal. Most recently published were the Manchester Daily Express and the Manchester Express. All were published in Manchester, contained feature articles about the city, and were free.

Due in part to a grant from the Cogswell Benevolent Trust, the library has been able to microfilm the surviving issues of these titles. Once they are processed, these microfilmed newspapers should be available for public use in the New Hampshire Room sometime after Labor Day. 

In this novel, two households—one white, the other Iranian-American—are brought together when they each adopt a Korean infant.

The Girl With the Dragon Tattoo by Stieg Larsson Feb. 10th

In this suspense novel, journalist Mikail Blomkvist and his multipierced and tattooed research assistant Lisbeth Salander are hired to investigate the decades-old disappearance of a teenage heiress in a remote part of Sweden.

The Power of One by Bryce Courtnay Mar. 10th

This novel is about a young white boy growing up in Apartheid South Africa during the 1930s and the 1940s.

The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks by Rebecca Skloot Apr. 14th

This nonfiction account tells of how a poor African American woman became the donor of cancer cells that created the Hela cell line, used in often groundbreaking medical research. The book examines the ethics of her unwitting contribution, and the effect it had on her family and modern medicine.

The Help by Kathryn Stockett May 12th

Set in the early 1960s when the civil rights movement was getting underway in Jackson, Mississippi, this is the story of the black women employed as maids and nannies in white households, and the white woman who risks social banishment to write about their lives




