All the library staff wishes you a safe and enjoyable summer! We do hope the sun keeps shining!

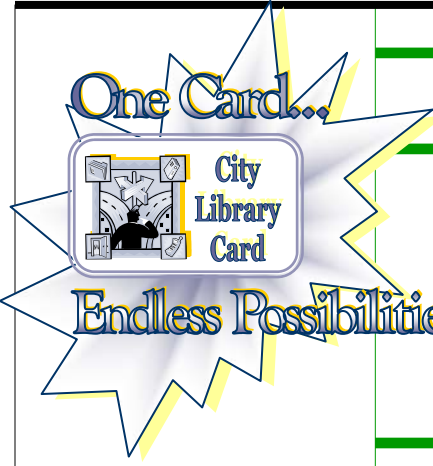


**DONATIONS**

We are beginning preparations for our 2011 One Card...Endless Possibilities program. Every September the American Library Association sponsors Library Card Sign-Up month. This provides libraries across the United States a chance to encourage members of their community to take advantage of all the services and materials a library has to offer. We have added a bit of a different spin to our library card campaign:

First of all, we run our Fall Library Card Campaign in October. We do this so that people who sign up for a library card at school open houses our library attends in September have an opportunity to take advantage of our One Card program.

Secondly, for the last four years, the Manchester City Library has partnered with local businesses in Manchester to offer discounts and special offers to Manchester Library customers old and new who present a library card at participating establishments throughout the month of October.

In 2010, we had 32 businesses participate. 16 of those businesses have signed up to be partners with us again in the fall of 2011. When Fall rolls around, we would love to have an array of new businesses partnering with us. ## SAY CHEESE!

In April 2011, we began adding photographs to library accounts. This is a strategy intended to safeguard the security of your library account. Since our customers are responsible for anything checked out on their account, we want to ensure that whomever we are checking out materials to is in fact you. It is also important it is to notify us should you lose your library card. By contacting us, we can take additional measures to prevent unauthorized use of your card.

Thank you for your patience as our circulation staff has acclimated to the addition of this new task at the circulation desk. If you have not yet had the pleasure of saying "Cheese" at the circulation desk, please come on down and we'll be more than happy to take your photo. Should you have questions of any kind, please do not hesitate to ask.

## PATRON PARKING

Did you know that there is now free parking at the main library? The lot on the Concord Street side of the building is now a library-use only, 2-hour limit lot. It is patrolled by our friends at Parking Control. We hope

this will make visiting the library even easier for you. There are also plenty of metered parking spaces on the streets around the library, as well as in the Hartnett Lot diagonally across from us.

## LIBRARY TRUST FUNDS

Did you ever wonder how the library provides so many programs? Or how we man-  
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age to have a grand piano in our auditorium?

The Libraries are fortunate to have had benefactors who made bequests to the libraries dating back to 1872. Members of the Manchester Community over the years have left parts of their estate or made bequests to the library to provide for future generations of library users. The Manchester City Library Trustees have an endowment that consists of 30 named funds which generate interest income for the libraries to expend. The Trust Fund endowment is professionally managed and currently has a market value of \$3.3 million dollars. We can only spend the income generated from these funds. Every year a budget is set based on the income earned to expend. We use these funds for library materials, programming, staff development, furniture, computer equipment, to maintain our grounds and to support the Learn to Read program. If you are reading this posting on one of the library's Internet Computers then you are using something which was purchased with our Trust Funds (courtesy of the Allen G. Cote estate).

Some of our named funds will sound familiar to you if you know your Manchester history! Here are just a few tidbits about our funds:

Does the name Frank P. Carpenter sound familiar? He is the gentleman who built the main library on Pine Street! When he passed away in 1939 he "bequeathed unto the Manchester City Library the sum of \$25,000, the income of which only is to be used for the purchase of books or repairs on the building."

In 1872 Mr. Oliver Dean bequeathed \$5,000 "income of this fund will be appropriated to the purchase of books". Today the interest from this fund is used to buy children's books.

In 1892 Mary E. Elliot made a bequest in memory of her husband of "\$2,000 to be securely invested, the annual income spent for the purchase of medical books and publications."

In 1939 the gift of a piano from the Charminade Club to the Manchester City Library was made. So our grand piano was a donation too!

In 1991 Ms. Stella Pinksa Keene left funds to support the purchasing of Polish related materials.

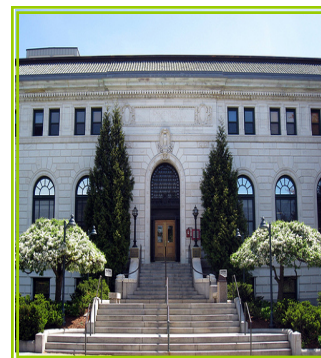
The Mary C. Manning bequest in 1966 was made for any library purpose in the amount of \$20,000.

The will of Mary Melville Tolman stated "I give and bequeath unto the Manchester City Library of said Manchester, the sum of two thousand dollars, the income of which only shall be used for the benefit of the Library, preferably for the purchase of books." (1934)

Nora K. Jones left funds in 1958 to the Library Trustees and the income is unrestricted. The income generated from this fund is used to purchase library materials and any needed furniture and equipment for the libraries.

Emily E. Smith in 1961 left \$5,000 to the library. Her will states: "the use and income to be applied annually to the purchase of books for the City Library, but the principle

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shall be kept unimpaired and as a separate fund."

The Helene Mansur McCallaster fund was established in 1970 and the income only to be used "to purchase books and other materials for the use of the patrons of the library".

In 1984 Mr. Edmund Bolan named the Manchester City Library as his only beneficiary. The annual income from this fund supports our library programming, staff development and landscaping.

Former Trustee Kevin C. Devine established the Clothilde Devine Fund in memory of his mother which has the restriction that the income be used for library staff development.

The John J. Sheehan fund was set up in 1993 to honor his many years of service to the Manchester City Library where he served as a Trustee from 1948-1988. His daughter, Karen Sheehan Lord, is currently a member of our board. The income from these funds currently purchases books for the Branch.

In 2010 the Laurence Feldman fund was created with donations from his brother and sister. This memorial fund was established "to support computer and technology access at the branch as well as to support occasional holiday celebrations and programs for the patrons and staff."

In 1988 the estate of Adelaide Dodge bequeathed money to the library to support the purchase of books on the subjects of Art, History, Government and Literature.

Frank H. Waters bequeathed \$3,000 in trust for the City Library to be administered by the Trustees of the library to use the income from donation for the purchase of book for the library. Today we use these funds to buy Young Adult Books.

We truly appreciate having our Trust Funds so that we can enhance library services. Careful stewardship by Library Trustees, past and present, has allowed these funds to grow and support our mission.

## FOUNDATION NEWS

During National Library Week, the board sponsored John Clayton, well known Manchester columnist and author, as the guest speaker for our annual event. John provided the audience with a great presentation and interesting information. Thank you, John.

Donor names and addresses are entered in our database. Our next project to complete the database is to add phone numbers and/or email addresses. The board will not be sharing or selling this information with any other organization. To insure our success in this effort, our spring donation letter will repeat this

request.

Board member Kara Fontaine's term expired this quarter, and she is leaving us after years of great service and dedication to the Foundation Board. We will miss you, Kara, and we thank you for all of your unselfish efforts. Your library's Foundation Board is seeking volunteer board members to serve as directors. Providing financial contributions is only one way of giving back to the library for all it has done for the community. Your time is also valuable

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asset which we are in need of. The library's needs are not all met by funds provided from the city. The board provides funds where none can be allocated through the city budget process managed by the trustees. The election of board officers will be held on June 16th, at the regular meeting.

The board asks those who are considering planned giving with their financial planning to consider the Foundation Funds currently listed, or for you to create a fund of your own desires. Help the Manchester City Library remain a sound financial institution.



## LOOKING FOR YOUR ANCESTORS?

Summer is here, and it is the perfect time to get some sunshine and hunt for your ancestors. First you must do the research, which can be extremely rewarding by itself. Knowing where your family resided is helpful. Finding out where they are buried will complete the circle of their lives.

Some of the older gravestones can give you a clue to the family's wealth or the symbolism will tell you about their occupation, ethnic background, or organizations to which they belonged. Some gravestones are works of art.

Each town or cemetery has their own rules for their graveyards, as does the State of New Hampshire. Many do not allow gravestone rubbing as it can ruin the fragile stones and damage the infor-

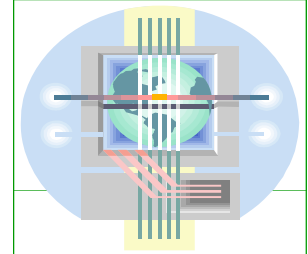
mation written on them. Photographing a stone is much better and provides a record for the future if the stone is damaged by natural causes, such as acid rain.

If you are not sure where to begin finding your ancestors, a visit to the New Hampshire Room at the library can provide a good place to begin your search. Most of the information in the room is about New Hampshire, but some of the same principles of genealogy can be applied to other areas. There are also books on gravestone art.

Who knows what you will find or where your path will lead you. You are sure to find some surprises and challenges along the way.

A rain garden is a planted depression in the earth that allows rainwater runoff from impervious urban areas like roofs, driveways, walkways, parking lots, and lawn areas the opportunity to be filtered. This reduces rain runoff by allowing storm water to soak into the ground. They can be designed for specific soils and climates. Rain gardens improve the water quality in nearby bodies of water and can cut down on the amount of pollution reaching creeks and streams by up to 30%.

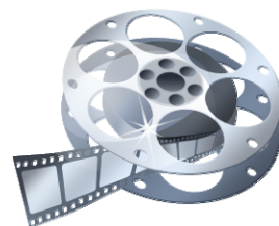

Participation is easy: Each time you

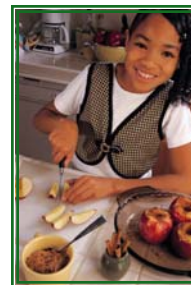

### NON RESIDENT CARD FEE
