## NEW COMPUTERS FOR THE PUBLIC



Starting in late August, the library will be rolling out all new computers with Microsoft Windows and Office, at both the main library and West branch. Sue Harmon, our Head of Information & Technology, has been hard at work with the city's Information Systems department, configuring and setting up the new PCs with CASSIE device and print management software. The new PCs will replace our older, Linux-based workstations from Useful, and are made possible by a grant from Southern New Hampshire University, as part of the [City of Manchester's Build Back Better](#) regional challenge.

## 4TH ANNUAL STAFF ART SHOW

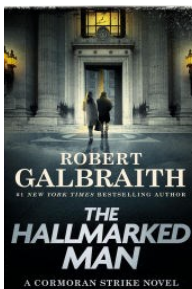

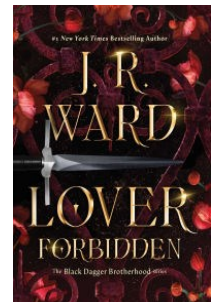
Galbraith, Robert – [The hallmarked man](#)

Alexander, Tasha – [The sisterhood](#)

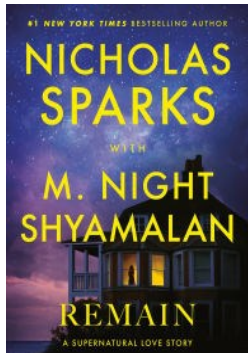

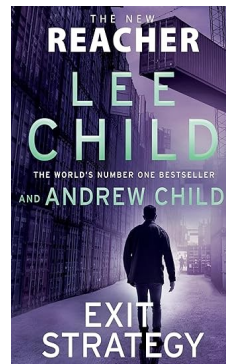
hate and greed fester below the surface of Wren's life, and Tate must unearth the truth about the past. *October 14*

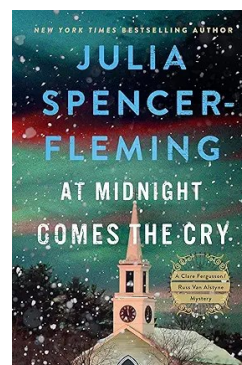
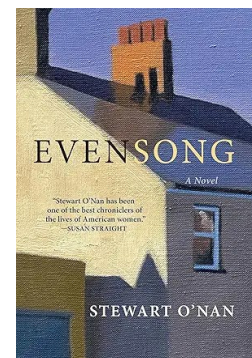
Child, Lee – Exit strategy

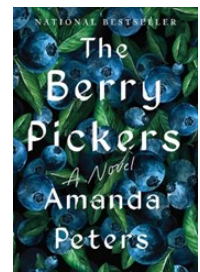
### Wednesday Evening Book Club

**Peters, Amanda. *The Berry Pickers*.** 2023, Fiction

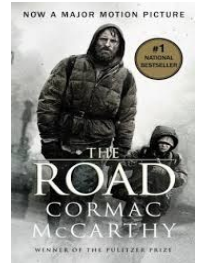

**McCarthy, Cormac. *The Road*.** 2006, Fiction

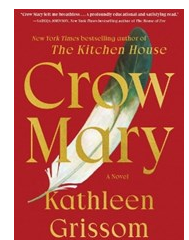

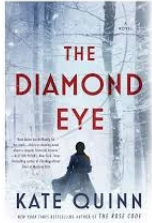

**Quinn, Kate. *The Diamond Eye*. 2022, Historical Fiction**

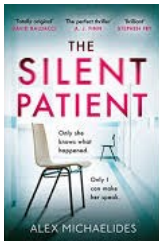

### **Tyranny Takes Root: Vladimir Putin's Russia, 1994-2025**

Examines the history of Vladimir Putin's rise to power and his subsequent authoritarian dictatorship over Russia. Beginning with his time as deputy mayor of St. Petersburg in 1994 and his subsequent rise to power as president of Russia in 2000, the discussion analyzes how Putin used authoritarian tactics to cement his hold on power and eradicate sources of opposition to his leadership. Moreover, the talk highlights how Putin's ideological vision of a newly restored Russian empire—as well as the dictator's deep resentment of U.S. foreign policy—have shaped Russia's actions in the world, including its invasion of Ukraine since 2022.

Presented by Brandon K. Gauthier, adjunct professor of History at Fordham University, and Director of Global Education at The Derryfield School.
